Incorporated as a not-for-profit organization in 1997, the Stewart-Marchman-Act Foundation is structured to support Stewart-Marchman-Act Behavioral Healthcare programs and activities. The Foundation board of directors voted unanimously to change its name from Stewart-Marchman Foundation to the “Stewart-Marchman-Act Foundation” to show support for Stewart-Marchman Center’s merger with Act Corporation.

The Foundation, now in its tenth year, was founded by Jim Foster, former President of Daytona International Speedway. In its tenth year of existence it was founded to enhance the services of Stewart-Marchman-Act Behavioral Healthcare. Foundation leadership recognized that public funds (tax dollars) would only pay for key services and not for the ancillary things that make a world class program. As of this date the Foundation has accumulated total assets of around 3 million dollars. Current efforts to expand capacity for residential substance abuse treatment with the Vince Carter Sanctuary in Bunnell, Florida will significantly increase the asset base of the foundation and allow more services to be provided in better facilities.
